# Big Sur Cloning

As many of you know, I was able to snag an eBay deal on a 2015 MacBook Pro 2.8 Ghz 16GB ram with no display and actually got one for \$300 plus Sales Tax.

I was able to put in NMVe SSD 500GB and thought I should upgrade to a 1TB drive.

One of the discussion problems I was seeing about Big Sur Mac OS X 11.2 was more in line with M1 Macs but no so much on the later Macs. Because of the APFS format of the drive, it is actually two partitions, one with the system files, and the other for the DATA files with has the Users folders.

So I was not sure if Carbon Copy Cloner, or even Ditto, would work. So I decided to do it the Apple Way, which seems simpler and straight forward. I had to format the NMVe SSD in its own case on my iMac to APFS format. Even though I have an NMVe adaptor in the Apple proprietary connector, in my search, it said it would not be able to format. Hence the eternal drive you see in this image that is connected to the laptop.



So I booted up the laptop into restore mode command + R key, as most Macs have a restore partition about the size of 700 MB. In restore you do need an internet connection as the OS may have new updates, as it had in this case. Before I left my bubble to do errands, the laptop had booted up several times creating the partitions that were needed.

Here is the back of the laptop and you need to remove several screws for removal.

# Big Sur Cloning Continued


Here you can see the 500GB NMVe SSD resting in its adapter, it slides in and one screw holds its down. Both are the same physical size but storage size will be doubled. Also you see the glued, yes GLUED in battery, but there are safe DIY ways to remove with out a FIRE! It's Lithium you know!!!

Here are the two drives and the adapter that is needed for this to work.



Since the new drive is bootable, I had used the Restore and Migration that is built into the Mac OS. All I had to do was swap the drives. And in reverse order, to put it back together, if you look at the battery, I always disconnect the connector so as not to fry anything.


Now checking what I have done.



A lot of free space compared to the 500GB I had put in. This is one of the last upgradeable MacBook Pro, and with the new M1, no upgrade path and that's another story for a future discussion.

It does have TRIM support and it correctly sees the SSD.

So I have a good working laptop to write and do photography.



# Connecting to Friends and Family Members

There are many ways to communicate electronically with people these days, keeping a safe distance. This article explores ways to communicate with lots of people at the same time.

#### By Email

You can create a group of contacts in your email program. Then you can create and send a message to that group and they will all get your message.

Use the BCC (Blind Carbon Copy) line for the group so that all the email addresses aren't visible to everyone. This protects the privacy of the recipients.

#### By Phone

Did you know that you can set up a conference call with all your friends and family for free?

Freeconferencecall.com is a free service that allows an unlimited number of people to call a phone number, enter an access code, and talk with all the other people on the line. The phone number to call isn't local, so long-distance charges may apply. However, most people have unlimited long distance for calls within the US these days.

Freeconferencecall.com also offers free screen sharing and video conferences. Compare their services to others on their website (scroll down to see the chart). (www.freeconferencecall.com/online-meetings)

### By Video

There are many options for face-to-face communication using video. Your computer or device would need to have a camera.

In addition to freeconferencecall.com, noted above for audio meetings, there are also these other apps that are free (or very low-cost).

Zoom (https://zoom.us/) is a popular video conference application. The free version allows for unlimited 1 to 1 meetings, 40-minute sessions for 3 or more people, application sharing, and collaboration. Click to read about all their offerings (https://zoom.us/pricing). They are offering added support and training during the pandemic. Skype (www.skype.com/en/) is a free video communication tool that you can use to connect to other people who have Skype accounts. Software downloads are available for Windows, Mac, and Linux desktops and Apple and Android mobile devices. Click for a list of features (www.skype.com/en/features/). Skype also offers free video conferences and conference calls that anyone can join even if they don't have a Skype account; no special software is required. Read more about this feature

# Use Keyboard Commands to Create Screenshots in Win10

I learn something new every day. To someone's question "In Windows 7 (or 8 or 10), is there a simple way to press "print screen," and then press just one more key (on the keyboard) to have the image automatically stored in a .jpg file with an auto-generated filename?"

I learned from the answer posted on Quora.com by Pauli Vaara:


"Windows 10 has it built-in. Hold down the Windows key while pressing PrintScreen, and the screenshot will be stored in your user account's Pictures > Screenshots folder in .png format, which keeps the original quality, unlike .jpg, which 'mushes' everything more or less."

The modifiers (holding down ALT, or Shift, or Control) while doing this don't seem to have the same effect as without the Windows key. They used to let you select a section of the screen or the active window. Holding down Windows-ALTPrtScrn will capture the active window

only and save it in your user account's Video/Captures folder as a .png.

I used to use Windows-Shift-S to bring up the, also built-in, Windows 10 snipping tool. That allows selecting the area to be snipped. That saves the snip to the clipboard. With notifications turned on, it allows you to click and edit and share, but it brings up the Photos app. Maybe that is sometimes useful. One can annotate. modify, save, or "share" (send to email.) Sharing here in Photos also includes, in Windows 10, the ability to share directly to "nearby" computers which also have the feature "share with nearby computers" turned on. The other computer must accept the share (like AirDrop on iPhones.)

Need a screenshot of something while in Word, Excel, or PowerPoint on Windows 10? That is now built into those programs. Check the Insert menu. So, more than one way to skin a cat.



# Genealogy Report for 1/5/21 SIG Meeting

The Genealogy SIG organized by Sue Mueller met on January 5, 2021 at 7:00 pm via Zoom. We had 23 members and one guest in attendance.

Helen Shimek was our guest speaker. She first gave an overview of DNA as a genealogy tool. The main topic was how to use Ancestry's ThruLines to analyze DNA matches. Ancestry now has eighteen million people in their data base making them the largest testing company. Many consider it the best test to take first as you venture into genetic genealogy. Then your raw DNA can be uploaded to other sites to expand your matches. Some of Helen's tips were:


- Always have a goal in mind when beginning a search
- Use ThruLines or other similar tools as tips, not facts. The tool is based on information on other member trees and

may or may not be thoroughly documented.

- Don't add a person to your tree until you have checked all the sources found through ThruLines
- Living DNA is known for its British and Irish data bases
- Some people only take DNA test for ethnicity or health analysis and may not be interested in tracking family history, so not everyone will respond to your query
- My Heritage and 23andMe have similar tools
- Never give up!

# Smartphone & Tablet Report for 1/25/21 SIG Meeting

Before describing the SIG Meeting, I want to advise readers of the importance of the iOS 14.4 and iPad OS 14.4 update. Apple disclosed that three vulnerabilities in the pervious versions of iOS 14 had been exploited by hackers and stressed the urgency of updating to the latest version to patch these vulnerabilities. News about this issue became widespread just after our SIG meeting. On to the meeting...

Despite not having met in December, no one brought questions for discussion. Last time we met, one member had wanted to know more about Widgets on the iPhone and we did not get to that subject. So we showed how to add Widgets to the Home Screen, a novelty added in iOS 14. We also went over stacking Widgets to avoid taking too much screen space and how Smart Stacks let Siri choose what Widget was on top depending on your usual activity at that time of day. We also reviewed the App Library and the alphabetic app listing that appears in the Library when you tap on Search and how to hide Home Screens that contain apps that you use infrequently.

I related a story of my search for a phone that has Face ID so my wife can more conveniently access Last Pass, her password manager. She has trouble using Touch ID on her iPhone 7 Plus. I had settled on an iPhone 12 Pro but came across an article describing how the magnetic fields and radios of all iPhone 12 models might interfere with medical devices such as pacemakers and defibrillators. Apple warned that the phone must be kept at least 6 inches from such devices or 15 inches away if wirelessly charging. Because my wife has a

pacemaker and sometimes falls asleep with her phone on her chest, I gave up on the idea of getting her one of these phones. Instead, I will get the new phone and she will inherit my iPhone 11 Pro Max.

Tongue in cheek, we stayed with the medical theme by asking if iPhones can get a virus. If you do not modify or "jailbreak" the phone and only get apps from the App Store, the answer is no. The OS is constructed to "sandbox" apps which prevents any app from accessing other apps. For that same reason any antivirus app would not work on an iPhone or iPad.

Sticking with Safety and security, I read portions of an article on "8 Apps Security Experts Would Never Have on Their Phone". We discussed the reasons for the apps being on the list. The 8 apps are: Google Assistant, WhatsApp, Facebook Messenger, Pokemon Go, Certain VPN's, COVID-19 tracing apps that did not come from the state, abandoned or unsupported apps and apps not obtained from your phone's app store. If your app is on the list, Google the title in quotes and read why the app is included in the list.

Apple continued to add privacy and security measures to this OS version. We went through many of them. Recording indicators show when the camera or microphone are turned on. Access to photos can be restricted. Apps can be restricted to knowing only your approximate location if their function does not require your precise location. Safari can give you a Privacy Report showing trackers that websites have attempted to install. You obtain a notice when an app


reads your clipboard. Safari also can check saved passwords for breaches and reuse of the same password.

The meeting drew to a close with a reminder that everyone should enter Emergency ID Information in the Health app. EMT's and ER staff know how to check for this information if the phone's owner cannot respond and the phone is locked. On a lighter note we

demonstrated using the Shazam music recognition app to identify song name and artist. IOS 14 included this app in the Control Center.

The next virtual SIG meeting will be held on Monday, February 22 at 7:00 PM. All are welcome.


# Directions to Wayside Presbyterian Church for CUE Meetings

Wayside Presbyterian Church, at 1208 Asbury Road, is approximately three blocks north of the intersection of Asbury Road and Route 5. This intersection is at the northwest corner of the Erie International Airport property. Following Asbury, turn left at the first marked driveway for the church. During the afternoon winter schedule (10:00 AM for the months of November, January, February and March), entry is through the two sets of blue double doors. Use the buzzer to gain entry if the doors are locked. During the normal evening schedule (7:00 PM the remaining months) use the double doors on the south side of the Christian Education wing. Signs are posted in the building to direct you to the meeting room.

From West of Erie International Airport: Follow Route 5 to the intersection of Asbury and Route 5. Turn hard left onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From South of Erie: Take Interstate 79 north to the 26th Street (Route 20) Exit. Bear left onto 26th Street (Route 20) west. Follow Route 20 about 3.4 miles west to Asbury Road. Turn right (at the Sheetz Gas Station) onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From East of Erie International Airport: Follow 26th Street (Route 20) west to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection. OR, follow 12th Street (Route 5) west past the airport to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.
