


April CUE Meeting



Windows Free Paint App - Overview By Jim Cerny at Sarasota Technology Users Group (https://thestug.org/)

The PAINT app or program comes free with all editions of Windows. It comes with many options for you to create your drawings or images and to modify others. I would encourage you to explore Paint and put it on your desktop. You will find it very useful if you take the time to try it! Here is a quick overview of what Paint can do.

If you do not have an icon on your Windows desktop for Paint (and I think you should), you can open the app anytime by clicking on the "Windows" icon on the extreme bottom-left on your screen. This will bring up an alphabetical list of all your apps in the left column. Scroll down (the scrollbar for this list may be challenging to see or find – a curse on the designers who hide stuff – it is VERY narrow at the top of the list, on the right edge of the list (not the window, just the list column). If your mouse finds it, it should widen to a normal scrollbar width that you can see and use. (They certainly did not ask me when they designed this!) Anyway, scroll down until you see "Windows Accessories" and click on the down arrowhead just to the right to open the contents of this folder. Next, you should see "Paint" and click on it to open it. (Note this is NOT "Paint 3D"). You can find out everything about Paint by asking Google and viewing some good videos about using it. But here is a quick picture of its features.

You can open almost any image (photo, drawing, clipart, etc.) in Paint (using the "File" tab/menu). The file types that Paint can work with are BMP, JPEG, GIF, PNG, and single-page TIFF formats. Now you are free to play with that image any way you want. You can draw on it, add text or shapes, crop the image, and much more. You can also SAVE the image (use the "Save as" option), and you can save your image as a different file type.

Have you a desire to be an artist? On the "Home" tab/menu, you can use Paint to draw and create your images. Select your color or pick your color from a palette, pick a drawing tool (pen, brush, marker, etc.), the size or width of your line, and draw away. There are many useful shapes as well, such as ovals, boxes, arrows, and more. You can even zoom in as close as you wish to see and work with each tiny pixel if you want. That is about as detailed as you can get. Remember, zooming in or out on an image does not change the image size; it just lets you view the image closer or farther away. If you make a mistake, the "undo" arrow at the top will erase the last thing you did.

You can "Resize" an image (to save memory size), rotate the image, erase things in the image, or select some part of the image for some action, such as copy or delete. Yes, you can add text in a "box" or right on the image.

Has Paint now sparked some interest? Please use Google to ask about how to use Paint and explore its many options. It is a very fun tool, easy to use, and will boost your creativity too! No real paint, no canvas, and no mess!



Genealogy Report for 3/7/23 SIG Meeting

Sue Mueller opened the March Genealogy SIG Zoom meeting at 7:00 on March 6th. Fifteen were in attendance.

Connie opened the discussion by showing an example of My Heritage's Deep Story. This feature animates one of your family photos, and if you add a script, the photo will come to "life". These short videos can be shared with family and friends. A few can be done with a free My Heritage membership. If you want to see a one minute animation they did of Abraham Lincoln click on

There was also a discussion about some issues with Family Tree Maker since the new 24.2 update. Most were having no problems, but there were some known issues. Using the live chat feature on MacKiev.com may help.

Conrad and his brother interviewed their mother in 1992 and had three hours of her talking about their dad's side of the family. Grise Audio Visual Center at 2402 Cherry St., in Erie, converted the tapes that had 267 minutes to a thumb drive. The Blasco Library will convert old forms of data to DVD. It is free if you bring a DVD, but



time-consuming since it converts in realtime. Carl Z. bought his own machine to convert 8mm tapes and has 100s of hours of time in the project. He is also identifying people in his videos for future generations. Liz W. suggested that it's always a good idea to make three copies at once since one might malfunction.

Smartphone & Tablet Report for 3/27/23 SIG Meeting

Paul Francis brought a question of lost icons on his iPhone's home screens after recent iOS updates. The apps were accessible through Spotlight Search but the icons were not present on the screen. Our discussion was of some help but he could still not find all of his icons.

Last month we introduced the security problem in which bad actors who stole your iPhone can take control of your accounts and change your Apple ID if they observed you entering your unlock passcode. We looked at a video proposing an additional layer of security to protect against this loss of control. We learned that going to Settings/Screen Time turning on Screen Time, Use Screen Time Passcode, enter a 4 digit code, then tap Content & Privacy Restrictions, and under Allow Changes - select Don't Allow for both Passcode Changes and Account Changes. So anyone cannot make damaging changes to take over your Apple ID and email account without the additional Screen Time Passcode.

We discussed why one might use additional browsers on an iPhone to supplement the default Apple Safari. Primarily, Safari may not work with some online forms or online banking applications but it still is a good general purpose browser given Apple's emphasis on privacy and security. We reviewed Safari settings recommended to allow the browser to afford the user the most privacy and security. Settings/Safari and choose DuckDuckGo as your search engine, turn Block Pop-Ups on, and under Privacy and Security turn on all on but Block All Cookies. Blocking All Cookies disables some website functions. Now that it is

Spring, we looked at a video on (spring) cleaning and maintaining your iPhone and iPad that had a number of useful tips.

Anyone who has seen Google Pixel ads for Magic Eraser envys this AI capability for erasing an unwanted object or people from a photo. Apple uses AI to extract images from a photo which is nice, but it would also be nice to be able to erase the unwanted. Google has now released the Magic Eraser capability for the iPhone but requires you to use Google Photos and pay a subscription fee to Google One. We looked at a video showing how this all works on an iPhone.

I had never explored using Siri Shortcuts so we took the opportunity to learn about this app which has been around for some time. Shortcuts gives the user the ability to create or use small programs which can combine multiple steps into a single action. We saw how making a face time call to a particular individual can be done in a single tap of an icon using Shortcuts.

Of particular note we saw how, using a shortcut downloaded from the web, Siri can be transformed from its limited capabilities into "Siri Elite". The shortcut can be actuated by voice through Siri and its function is to access ChatGPT as a much more satisfying digital assistant. In the example we watched, "Siri Elite" returned results both by spoken word and written result. Shortcuts offers a powerful tool to iPhone or iPad users but it requires practice in using the tool as well as some forethought in what you want to automate.


There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

A Note from the Editor



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
Directions to Wayside Presbyterian Church for CUE Meetings

Wayside Presbyterian Church, at 1208 Asbury Road, is approximately three blocks north of the intersection of Asbury Road and Route 5. This intersection is at the northwest corner of the Erie International Airport property. Following Asbury, turn left at the first marked driveway for the church. During the afternoon winter schedule (10:00 AM for the months of November, January, February and March), entry is through the two sets of blue double doors. Use the buzzer to gain entry if the doors are locked. During the normal evening schedule (7:00 PM the remaining months) use the double doors on the south side of the Christian Education wing. Signs are posted in the building to direct you to the meeting room.

From West of Erie International Airport: Follow Route 5 to the intersection of Asbury and Route 5. Turn hard left onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From South of Erie: Take Interstate 79 north to the 26th Street (Route 20) Exit. Bear left onto 26th Street (Route 20) west. Follow Route 20 about 3.4 miles west to Asbury Road. Turn right (at the Sheetz Gas Station) onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From East of Erie International Airport: Follow 26th Street (Route 20) west to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection. OR, follow 12th Street (Route 5) west past the airport to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.
