Download CUE Newsletter

An odd thing happened the other day and maybe you can add to this article at our next CUE Zoom Meeting. I do want to add publicly that Don Grim was able to fill the shoes of our late editor Mark Matson and those shoes are much larger than the ones that Don wheels on special occasion as a Clown! A member called me the other day that he was having trouble downloading our newsletter and, after talking, I told him to give me a try on replicating his problem.

I think this only happens when you use Outlook mail in Windows 10 and it's specific to the operating system. And PLEASE correct me if I am wrong as I think the mail client in windows 10 is browser-based and not an actual standalone application. I usually tell people to get a real mail application, like Thunderbird, or any other that is out there.

Back in the day, Windows Office had an excellent apps, in Outlook Express and Outlook, that came with their Office Suite and those of you Mac users, with Microsoft for the Mac, had Entourage.

Microsoft Entourage is a discontinued email client, and personal information manager, that was developed by Microsoft for Mac OS 8.5 and later. Microsoft first released Entourage in October 2000 as part of the Microsoft Office 2001 office suite. Office 98, the previous version of Microsoft Office for the classic Mac OS, included Outlook Express 5. The last version was Entourage: Mac 2008, part of Microsoft Office 2008 for Mac, released on January 15, 2008. Entourage was replaced by Outlook for Macintosh in Microsoft Office for Mac 2011, released on October 26, 2010.

I was able to duplicate his problem on an actual windows laptop which showed a window behind his mail, rather than in front, but on the virtual windows and Mac OS X, it worked the way it's supposed to (see images).

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So if you do have a problem and can't find the newsletter using the mail app in Windows 10, just minimize it and it should be there.

Now when I click on the link and a window comes up:

I did notice a yellow icon on the lower right of the taskbar saying updates are available. I clicked on it and 141 updates need to be installed. Now as you read this, why so many updates?? Now I knew he was on thin ice as everything on this computer is OLD, just like him and myself, and prone for breakdowns. I called him back to tell him what was happening and, after the update, I want to see what is exactly in the computer. Eventually after some restarts the computer was up to date. So I shut it down to look at the motherboard and what kind of setup it had. I was quite surprised that it had two interfaces for such an antiquated machine. It had an IDE for primary and secondary drives, either hard drives or CD/DVD drives, but in a little corner it had two SATA ports.

buried, I found an 86 folder with 3 DLL for USB. I wondered, will these work if I manually install them.

Now the DLL will reside in the Windows directory and specifically in the System32 folder so I copied and pasted them and rebooted, so they are loaded! After the reboot, and because I left the Epson CD in its tray and windows XP noted there was NEW hardware, it started to run and I do mean RUN. So I answered the prompts and as an Italian would say, Mama Mia!

It actually saw the Epson AIO printer. We set it to default and it printed the famous windows test Page.



Windows 10 Paint 3D

Microsoft has included a simple paint program with all earlier versions of Windows. In the latest update to Windows 10, a new version of Paint, called Paint 3D, is included. The addition of being able to create and edit 3D images is a significant change to the Paint program You can open Paint 3D from the Start menu.




If you search YouTube for Paint 3D you will find a long list of efforts by various individuals to create Paint 3D tutorials. Microsoft has provided their own introduction video.

Microsoft has not provided a user manual for Paint 3D. Instead they seem to be relying on YouTube videos to demonstrate various features of the program. If you are new to this stuff, it might be helpful to learn some of the basics of the user interface. Here are a few tips for using Paint 3D.




Selecting the Brushes tool displays 10 brush options in the right-side panel. This panel also provides options for Thickness, Opacity, Material, and Color. You can adjust Thickness and Opacity either by entering a value in a text box, or by using a slider found beneath the option.

Windows tip: Whenever you want to undo and action, for example drawing a line in a Paint program, press Ctrl+Z.


If you hover the mouse cursor over a brush, a tool tip will pop up showing the name of the brush.

- From the Menu, select New. You will get options to Save, Don't Save, or Cancel.
- Experiment with the 2D shapes options.
- Once you have selected a shape, drag out (left click at the start point and hold down the left mouse button and drag to the end point) the shape on your drawing.



Once you drag out a shape, the right-side panel will show options for modifying the shape.


• Change the Fill, Line Type, Thickness, and Opacity options.

• Grab Points at the corners and mid points of the shape let you change the size and proportions of the shape.

• Rotate tool is used to rotate the shape.

• Check mark tool completes the shape. You can also complete a shape by clicking somewhere away from the shape.

• Clone tool makes a copy of the shape. Here is an example of using the clone tool. See if you can duplicate the drawing.



First a multipoint star was dragged out. The clone tool was selected, and the new star was moved, resized, and the color was changed.

This clone process was repeated to make the yellow star. The process was repeated again, and the red star was rotated.


What about 3D? Here is an example of creating 3D text. Select the Text tool, and then select the 3D Text option.

Select the desired *Font*, *Size*, *Color*, *Style*, and *alignment* options, then enter your text.




This will open 3D text control tools. When the control tools are open, the text will be highlighted in cyan.



To increase the text depth, use the right side rotate tool to rotate the object more than 45 degrees. Then use the top midpoint grab point to drag the text to a new depth.




Paint 3D provides a collection of geometric shape that can be added to a drawing. Here are some 3D shapes.



In addition to 3D geometric shapes, several 3D models are available.

Once you have created and selected a 3D Model, you can use the Stickers tool to add stickers or textures to the surface of the model.




There is a large collection of 3D models available online. Use the 3D Library tool to get models.

One last thing to discuss is how the canvas is related to the position of 3D models. The canvas is like a sheet of paper that lies somewhere in the 3D space.


The illustrations show a dog and a cat. These models live in 3D space somewhere with respect to the canvas, and you can control who is in front of who.



The tool on the left side of the selected 3D model is used to slide the model in and out of the 3D space.



In the next illustration, the fill brush was used to paint the canvas green.



The dog model was selected and then dragged so that dog model was half in front of the green canvas, and half behind the canvas.

This provides a very brief tour of some of the features of Paint 3D. Perhaps it will give you enough information so that the YouTube videos about Paint 3D will make a little more sense.

Secretary's Report for 5/21/20 CUE Meeting

The members of Computer Users Of Erie (CUE) met remotely on the web with a Zoom video conferencing link.

David Williams, from Iowa, and part of APCUG, attended as a speaker who shared information titled "Why Engage in Social Media?".

There were 22 people in attendance, including David Williams. Their names on screen were names they chose as login names. Their names on screen were John Fair, iPad(3) (probably John Szympruch), Susan Bowser Mueller, Lee's iPhone X, David Williams, PAUL, Pat Mickel, Don, Suzanne Matthews, Judy's iPad, elizabeth wisniewski, Hal, jrobert, Iphone 11 marcia leller, timdonlin, Hal Kelley, annecon, Anne, Linda Williams, anne rosthauser, Janice, and DonGrimWithChromebook.

After David Williams' presentation, there was discussion and David shared where APCUG videos are located at youtube.com/user/APCUGVideos.

Paul Francis opened the CUE meeting by asking if there was any old business. Janice Castro asked the status of the Wayside church where meetings have been held in the past. John Fair mentioned that the Wayside building is closed until further notice.

Treasurer Janice Castro mentioned that the treasury typically is up and down. It is up with dues deposits then it tails off. For example, the treasury on 12/31/19 was \$3,102.19 and a current balance is \$2,670.19. Recent income included \$42 for dues from new members. Recent expenses included \$80 to Wayside, \$202 to Erie Insurance, \$100 to the Elks' Club for the Christmas Party, and \$92 for the PO Box.

There was discussion about the CUE Picnic. Sue Mueller suggested moving the picnic from July to September. Conrad Sobczak will look into that with a possible date of Thursday 9/10/20. CUE approved Conrad to change the date. For whatever month the Picnic occurs, there will not be a regular CUE meeting for that month.

Paul asked for any new business. Janice and John mentioned that we have some new members joining CUE.

For the CUE election this year, there are two open slots for board members. Paul is working on a list of nominees for all CUE positions. After that, John plans to set the election voting through Google Forms. That will be used for everyone this year for voting and not just for absent people like in past years, due to the current mission to avoid physical meetings.

On the subject of promoting Zoom for more CUE members to take advantage of it, and realize how fun and easy it is to use, John mentioned that we should have a special meeting on Zoom to allow people to ask questions on Zoom and computers. We would have CUE members available in the meeting to help answer those questions.

Janice mentioned to reimburse John for Zoom for when he was paying \$16 per month to have it available for CUE. CUE will pay for it in the future. Since, it is a cost of less than \$250 per year, it did not need to be brought up to a vote. John

confirmed to Paul that SIG's can use the same paid version of Zoom for their SIG meetings as long as they meet on a date when nobody else is using it.

John mentioned that we should continue to use Zoom. Sue mentioned that we can use Zoom even when there would be a physical meeting in the future. She used the example that it would allow Dave Howell to attend Genealogy SIG meetings from out of town. John agreed that it would be just as useful for regular CUE meetings for people who can't travel to a meeting.

To continue to promote Zoom, Paul mentioned to tell others how fun it is to use

Zoom. Sue added that a reminder before a Zoom meeting can help boost attendance.

John mentioned that he will continue to bring in APCUG speakers for future CUE meetings.

There was a request to adjourn the meeting. The members approved the adjournment of the meeting (first and second motions from John Fair and Hal Kelley).

A Note from the Editor



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
Directions to Wayside Presbyterian Church for CUE Meetings

Wayside Presbyterian Church, at 1208 Asbury Road, is approximately three blocks north of the intersection of Asbury Road and Route 5. This intersection is at the northwest corner of the Erie International Airport property. Following Asbury, turn left at the first marked driveway for the church. During the afternoon winter schedule (10:00 AM for the months of November, January, February and March), entry is through the two sets of blue double doors. Use the buzzer to gain entry if the doors are locked. During the normal evening schedule (7:00 PM the remaining months) use the double doors on the south side of the Christian Education wing. Signs are posted in the building to direct you to the meeting room.

From West of Erie International Airport: Follow Route 5 to the intersection of Asbury and Route 5. Turn hard left onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From South of Erie: Take Interstate 79 north to the 26th Street (Route 20) Exit. Bear left onto 26th Street (Route 20) west. Follow Route 20 about 3.4 miles west to Asbury Road. Turn right (at the Sheetz Gas Station) onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From East of Erie International Airport: Follow 26th Street (Route 20) west to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection. OR, follow 12th Street (Route 5) west past the airport to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.
